There are things in this life that we will never have answers for, because unlike God, we do not see life from creation to eternity and the intricate tapestry in which he is working out his good purposes. Without God to cry out to with our why's, we are left in despair.

If we put all our energy into the quest for understanding, we will never find the rest, peace and security we are looking for. However, as Christians we can find rest in our good God who rules this world for his glory and is working for good even in the hardest to understand circumstances. Our faith is not blind faith, but we have

We can pray these
words from Psalm 62:57: 'For God alone, O my

soul, wait in silence, for my hope is from him. He only is my rock and my salvation, my fortress; I shall not be shaken. On God rests my salvation and my glory; my mighty rock, my refuge is God'.

Genuine hopelessness is a terrible thing. Within my life, I think I have only ever genuinely seen hopelessness twice. Both people have become engrained in my mind, as I don't think I have witnessed anything so sad. To get a picture of the type of life-sapping sadness hopelessness can bring, consider Psalm

88. Without hope, there is no genuine way to live. People can manufacture hope, we can create false hope, but without any hope, people will not live long.

Elise writes a great article dealing with pain of suffering, reminding us of the hope we should all share as Christians. God's great gift to us in Christ is the sure of hope of the resurrection. The resurrection spurs Christians on through this life amongst its many struggles and strifes. Without the hope of the resurrection, there is no point to the pain and suffering of this world. They become a burden to escape. Society appears to be search for an escape to a problem that it has not realised

plagues it. In the bleakness and drudgery of life some turn to drugs as an escape, others sex, and others the banality of endless streaming, not realising they have moved from one cage to another. 
Eph. 4:19 Having lost all sensitivity, they have given themselves over to sensuality so as to indulge in every kind of impurity, and they are full of greed.
