

Diversity Cur Strength MASSIVE DIVISIVE

ne of my favourite words in the English language is supercilious. It means appearing or thinking you are superior to another person. I like it because the word sounds like 'super silly', which is how I think of the idea. The slogan, 'Diversity is our Strength' is a supercilious slogan and is incredibly divisive, which was shown to be manifestly true this week in the European Cup soccer final. Let me explain.

For those who don't know, which I suspect would be most Australians, England played Italy in the European Cup Final. My son and I caught the last part of the match. The game ended in a draw, which means that the teams had a penalty shoot out to decide the winner. In a penalty shoot-out, the teams pick five players and those players attempt to score a goal. It

is an intense moment generating a great deal of emotional pressure for spectators. That pressure on the players must be immense by comparison.

England lost the shoot out 3-2. My son and I exchanged a few words about the loss for England. I said England are notoriously bad at penalty shoot-outs. We turned off the T.V, forgot about the match and went about our day. The only thing I remembered from the game was as an advertisement from a car company carrying the slogan, 'We Drive Diversity' in the grating rainbow colours. I won't name them, but will remember them always, making sure never to buy from them.

A few days later a great deal of controversy about England's loss started appearing in my newsfeeds. Unbeknownst to me whilst watching the game, political activists in England had hijacked the team's performances in the lead-up to the final to further their political agenda. That political agenda being Marxist communism under the guise of, 'Diversity is our Strength'. They were using the racial make-up of the team as a vindication for their beliefs.

So it came as some surprise to learn that the three English players who missed the goals were black and the ones who scored were both white. Oops! Yet neither my son nor I noticed or spoke about their skin

colour at the time. This is what these political activists who say they care about racism have created in the West - people who view everyone through their skin colour.

'Diversity is Our Strength' is an atheistic humanist slogan preaching whilst manufacturing disunity. This worldview says that minority groups are being unjustly oppressed by a majority, labelling the majority evil simply for being the majority. There is genuine historical justification for some of what is said, but even the context of history is being rewritten to achieve the political end. This fosters the disunity it disingenuously seeks to counter by placing people into minority groups to create feelings of victimhood within those groups. It then seeks to entrench and use that enmity to further an often unstated political agenda. It is deliberately

divisive and evil and the worldview supporting the slogan is profoundly anti-Christian.

Christianity has no place for racism. In a biblical worldview there is only one race – the human race. As Paul says to the Christians in Galatians

"For those of you who were baptized into Christ have been clothed with Christ. There is no Jew or Greek, slave or free, male and female; since you are all one in Christ Jesus. And if you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's seed, heirs according to the promise." (Galatians 3:27–29)

'Diversity is Our Strength' is a false statement required to generate unity in an atheistic worldview by atomising individuals through skin colour. But to the contrary of its

stated aim - it will only ever divide people. Christian unity - true unity - is not based on manufactured identity groups pitted against one another for supremacy. Christians can disagree about politics because our unity is found in Christ's forgiveness. Christians have no place for the worldview being pushed by this dishonest slogan. The slogan is supercilious-y, and Christians will do well avoiding it!
