Sinai and heard God's voice, and that voice so terrified them that they wanted to run and never hear it again. It

In fact, I very rarely give deadlines. The nature of my work means I am relying on other people. I have a lot of developers wanting everything faster than I can give it and limited resources. My assurances take the shape of "I am aiming for.." or "I hope to.." or "the current anticipated timeframe is.." Very rarely do I say: I will definitely do this by the time you need it.

n Steps always feel firm. Sometimes they are faltering, weak, meandering. The path is slippery, the way is treacherous. Here is an image of us taking tentative steps down a slope, and we stumble; quicker than we know it, God has reached out, grabbed our arm, and pulled us

upright. We may feel like we have

fallen, but we haven't, because we

are God's righteous children.

But what does it mean to be righteous? The term righteous is scattered through the bible like stars in a clear night sky. How do we act righteous? How do we live as righteous people? Our righteousness is imputed to us through Jesus. What does righteous mean to live by it? Righteousness is credited to us by faith. Faith and righteousness go hand in hand. How do we make our hearts and hands move in harmony with them?

Psalm 37 points the way. Faith in God is not a passive, warm fuzzy feeling. It's active. it's conscious. it's committed. Psalm 37 spells out to us what it means to live by faith, to grow in righteousness.

Delight. Commit. Hope. Seek peace. Do good. Take refuge in him. Terms that give direction to our intentions, to our actions, to how we trust in God.

The words that resonated with me on Friday morning were "Be still before the Lord and wait patiently for him; do not fret when people succeed in their ways" I was fretting about my lengthy task list, about people pressing me for results. I felt myself slipping.

I was getting carried away by the minutiae of the day ahead. I was worrying; instead of trusting God and waiting patiently for him to do what he will with my day. I need to do the best I can, and trust God. Why am I fretting? Whatever happens, God will uphold me, and I will still be his when I close my eyes at night.

Friday was not productive, or efficient. I spent hours bogged down in detail that did not matter. I became frustrated and impatient, and urged myself not to be. I went outside and looked at the flowers which helped; I delighted in the Lord who had made them. I helped two colleagues resolve their problems. I chatted with a friend and we sought peace by laughing together. Later I watched Grease; I felt old and reflected on wasted vears. This led me to reflect on what a gift my current years are with Jesus, how I am so glad he called me back to him. The current difficult days are but a nanosecond, compared to eternity with our Lord.

Friday was a day to reach out to people, to reflect on the grace of God. It was a day to trust in the Lord, to commit to him, to follow his way, to delight in him. This is what I long to do, every day. Often I feel myself stumbling and slipping. I reach for my stronghold, my Lord.

Friday was a day for the Lord to uphold me, to love me, to make firm my steps, to deliver me, to bless me.

My Lord, my stronghold, I take refuge in You.

would have been a terrifying experience. They saw the mountain on fire and the presence of God was hidden from them by a dark cloud. Who would want to approach that?

But we have come to the Heavenly city, a city with the sound of a festive gathering. That is the joy of being a Christian. **Jesus** changes everything! We don't hear a terrifying voice from which we want to run, instead through the Spirit, the Father serenades us with His Word. I once heard a Christian say that if the logo of Christianity wasn't a cross, it would've been an ear. Christians listen

attentively to God's Word, and respond by worshipping acceptably.

This means we do not live as the world lives; we don't sleep around or drink excessively. We stand for the truth and righteousness even it costs us. Jesus changes everything. Though we live in a city of excesses and evil, Christians have come to the heavenly city, which causes us to live differently to those around us. Christian lives should be the contrast to our world's excesses and evils. And so we live knowing God has prepared a better city for His people. This is the acceptable worship God seeks from us, are we listening attentively?
